Parenting/Carer Seminar – Connecting and Communicating with your young person

Last week we hosted an online webinar for parents/carers that was run by clinicians from Headspace Hawthorn and Malvern. The webinar covered understanding mental health and recognising mental health difficulties; supporting your young person and approaching conversations about their mental health and building awareness of supports and services available for young people and families.

Education Week - Excursion to the University of Melbourne

Last week, during Education Week, current and future Physics students attended an excursion focusing on drag reduction and airplane design. The event was part of the Faculty of Engineering and Information Technology (FEIT) Film Festival at The University of Melbourne.

The event started off with the screening of the Australian movie 'Paper Planes'. After this, Professor of Engineering Design at the University of Melbourne, Katja Holtta-Otto led a discussion on how to build a paper plane that flies. The workshop that followed gave students the opportunity to build their own paper airplanes and test their ability to fly. Professor Holtta-Otto provided individualised feedback to each student on how to improve the initial design and fly their plane for an increased distance.

This was an excellent opportunity to promote our students' curiosity about the importance of engineering in our communities and to identify challenges of engineering and technology.

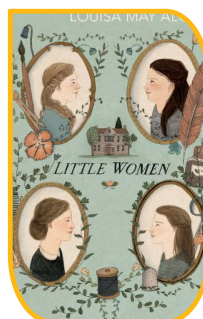

Interschool Division Cross-Country

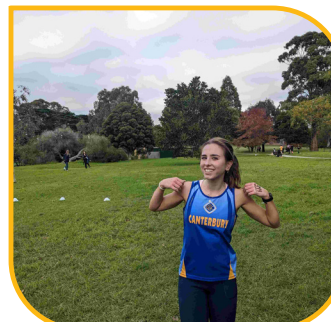

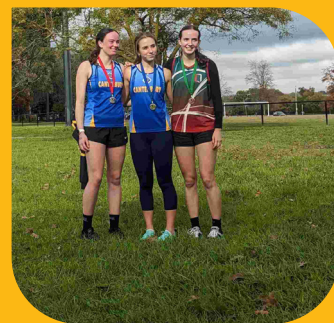
Interschool Snowsports

An article from the 1990's Mangarrian about the introduction of library automation at CGSC.

THE INTRODUCTION OF LIBRARY AUTOMATION

It was fitting perhaps that a librarian trained to work with borrowing cards and card catalogues should write about the introduction of library automation at CGSC: one needs to have struggled with filing and coped with the problems caused by filing errors to appreciate the ease and convenience of a light pen.

By themselves however computers are not a novelty; we librarians have come to rely on them for accurate listing of some library materials for the past three years. What is new, and to be celebrated in 1990 is the introduction of total (or nearly total) automation of library services.

With automation the lengthy operations involved in borrowing and returning books become fast and mistake free (students can only use their own card with their own photo to borrow). More important where students are concerned - the process of enquiry, of finding the book you need is more rewarding and fun: by typing the author, title, subject or any 'key word' i.e. any word however vaguely associated with a subject the students will obtain an answer on the screen. Also, they will be able to obtain answers to complex questions: not just 'WHALES' but 'WHALES' - 'in AUSTRALIA' 'ENDANGERED'; not just 'SMOKING' but 'SMOKING' 'among WOMEN' relation to DISEASE'. This is yet to come; so far only cataloguing (i.e. entering records)

and circulation (i.e. borrowing and returning books) have been automated. Unfortunately, due to lack of time and resources this year's students had to put up with the old-fashioned and less than accurate card catalogue - updated with an already out-of-date computer printout. The introduction of open access enquiry, which allows students to use computers to find out information had to be delayed for a year. In February 1991 however the students will be using at least two computers in the library; just in time for the introduction of VCE. Connecting more computers to the main station will be the joyful culmination of a long and tedious task: the transfer of the ca. 15,000 book records and the ca. 950 borrowers records into the system. We are certain that we would never have succeeded without the assistance of many people: Helen Breen from Laserflair and John Graham from Educad who helped transfer some 4,000 records from the old system into the new - automatically; Anne Peart from CGSC School Council who helped transfer some 1000's records - manually; Coralie Foster and Jude Vilensky from CGSC library who sacrificed some of their weekends and holidays to type records; and all students and staff who have accepted without complaining the unavoidable errors and blunders made by old-fashioned librarians learning new tricks.

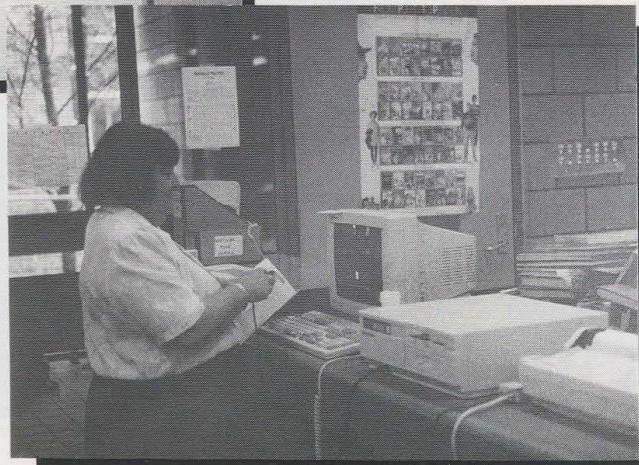
