We were impressed with the way the students navigated the challenges of being away from home, participated in activities that were, at times, outside their comfort zone and developed their French language skills. #### School Council information

#### What is a school council and what does it do?

All government schools in Victoria have a school council. They are legally constituted bodies that are given powers to set the broad direction of a school, in accordance with Ministerial Order 1280 Constitution of Government School Councils, and the Education and Training Reform Act 2006. In doing this, a school council may directly influence the quality of education for students.

#### Who is on the school council?

For most primary school councils, there are several possible categories of membership:

- A mandated elected parent member category more than one-third of the total members must be from this category according to Ministerial Order 1280. Department employees can be parent members at their child's school providing that they are not engaged in work at the school.
- A mandated elected school employee member category members of this category make up no more than one-third of membership. The principal of the school is automatically one of these members.
- An optional community member category members are co-opted by a decision of the council because of their special skills, interests or experience.
   Department employees are not eligible to be community members.
- A small number of school councils have nominee members. For all schools with a Year 7 and above cohort, there is an additional category of membership.
- A mandated elected student member category, two positions. Generally, the term of office for all members is two years. The term of office of half the members expires each year, creating vacancies for the annual school council elections.

#### Why is parent membership so important?

Parents on school councils provide important viewpoints and have valuable skills and a range of experiences and knowledge that can help inform and shape the direction of the school. Those parents who become active on a school council find their involvement satisfying and may also find that their children feel a greater sense of belonging.

#### Do I need special experience to be on school council?

Each member brings their own valuable skills and knowledge to the role, however, in order to successfully perform their duties, councillors may need to gain some new skills and knowledge. It is important to have an interest in your child's school and the desire to work in partnership with others to help shape the school's future.





#### Code of conduct for school councillors

School councils in Victoria are public entities as defined by the Public Administration Act 2004. School councillors must comply with the Code of Conduct for Directors of Victorian Public Entities issued by the Victorian Public Sector Commission. The Code of Conduct is based on the Victorian public sector values and requires councillors to:

- act with honesty and integrity be truthful, open and clear about their motives and declare any real, potential or perceived conflict of interest and duty
- act in good faith in the best interests of the school work cooperatively with other councillors and the school community, be reasonable, and make all decisions with the best interests of students foremost in their minds
- act fairly and impartially consider all relevant facts of an issue before making a decision, seek to have a balanced view, never give special treatment to a person or group and never act from self-interest
- use information appropriately respect confidentiality and use information for the purpose for which it was made available
- exercise due care, diligence and skill accept responsibility for decisions and do what is best for the school
- use the position appropriately not use the position as a councillor to gain an advantage
- act in a financially responsible manner observe all the above principles when making financial decisions
- comply with relevant legislation and policies know what legislation and policies are relevant for which decisions and obey the law
- demonstrate leadership and stewardship set a good example, encourage
  a culture of accountability, manage risks effectively, exercise care and
  responsibility to keep the school strong and sustainable.

#### Indemnity for school council members

School councillors are indemnified against any liability in respect of any loss or damage suffered by the council or any other person in respect of anything necessarily or reasonably done, or omitted to be done by the councillor in good faith in:

- a the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a councillor, or
- b the reasonable belief that the act or omission was in the exercise of a power or the performance of a function of a council.

In other words, school councillors are not legally liable for any loss or damage suffered by council or others as a result of reasonable actions taken in good faith.

#### How can you become involved?

By participating in, and voting in the school council elections, which are held in Term 1 each year. However, ballots are only held if more people nominate as candidates than there are positions vacant.

In view of this, you might consider:

- standing for election as a member of the school council
- encouraging another person to stand for election.

#### What do you need to do to stand for election?

The principal will issue a Notice of Election and Call for nominations in Term 1 of each year. Council elections must be completed by 31 March, unless varied by the Minister for Education.

If you stand for election, you can arrange for someone to nominate you as a candidate or, you can nominate yourself in the parent member category. You can





only be nominated by another member of the same category that you are eligible for (e.g. a member of the parent electorate may only nominate another parent of that electorate). Department employees with a child enrolled at a school where they are not engaged in work, are eligible to nominate for parent membership at that school.

Return your completed nomination form to the principal within the time stated on the Notice of Election. You will receive a Nomination Form Receipt via post, email or by hand delivery. Generally, if there are more nominations than vacancies a ballot will be conducted in the two weeks after the call for nominations has closed.

#### Remember

- Consider standing for election to school council.
- Ask the principal for instructions if you are not sure what to do.
- Be sure to vote if the election goes to ballot.
- Contact the principal if you are unsure about what is required at any stage of the election process.

#### **Assistant Principal's Report**

Welcome back to the start of 2024. Students in the Senior School are off to a great start.

#### **VCE Processes**

On Tuesday 30 January VCE teachers were reminded of a number of processes by Amanda Jackson, Head of Senior School. The following is a snapshot of the processes identified. Each student has also received the VCE Handbook, which also outlines the following processes in detail. A detailed explanation of these processes is on Compass.

#### **Overdue Coursework Form**

Teachers to identify activity(ies) in class so that students are able to achieve the outcome via the 'Satisfactory (S)' task. If a student can show satisfactory completion, they will receive an S for the outcome. However, if a student receives an N on a 'S' Task, this means they MUST pass their SAC. The teacher will complete the 'Overdue coursework form' and send this home to parents/guardians in an email (and include the Year Level Co-ordinators).

#### **Notification of Assessment Task**

All VCE students should be provided with at least 5 days' notice for a SAC. This can be emailed or sent to students via Compass.

#### Application to re-schedule a SAC or SAT due to absence

If a student has been absent from a SAC, they must have medical evidence of their absence if they are to sit this assessment. The student should collect this form from the Senior School office and negotiate a suitable time date for the rescheduled SAC or SAT. If they have assessment/s for any Year 12 subject/s, these must be done prior to leaving for a holiday.

#### Notification to redeem an Outcome

If a student does not achieve a 'satisfactory' result on an outcome by not demonstrating an understanding of the work, they will need to redeem this

work. Parents and guardians will be sent a 'Redemption of an Outcome' notice to encourage and support their student to complete this work.

Please note: Students are only given one opportunity to redeem each outcome. If the student does not undertake the Redemption of an Outcome on the date specified, they may achieve an N for Unsatisfactory Completion of this unit.

#### **Locker Allocations**

On the first day back, all students received their new locker allocation. In most cases, students have reused their old locks to secure their locker. However, there are a number of lockers around the school without locks. In the interests of security and safety, it is important that students secure their lockers as soon as possible. Combination locks will be available from the General Office or students are able to bring their own. I have also posted on Compass a video reminding students how to use their combination lock.

#### College Photos

College photos will be ordered through the Compass Portal under the Community Tab. By now parents and guardians should have received information from MSP photography. To place your order, make sure you have your Compass login details handy! If you're unsure of your login details, please contact the school for assistance. Once you've logged in, you'll need to follow a few easy steps!

Our upcoming catch up photo day will be on 9 February 2024 (Catch up day Whole School – Portrait Only).

#### Senior School Uniform

Please assist us with the expectations regarding the school uniform (Student Dress Code) which is on pages 18-19 of the Student Planner (school diary). We communicate this to all students on the first day back.

- We remind students to remove all coloured nail polish, fake eyelashes, and facial piercings.
- The only jewellery allowed = up to 2 plain stud earrings or sleepers worn in each ear and a watch or fitness tracker on the wrist. All other visible jewellery must be removed.
- Unnatural hair colours (e.g. Bright red, green, pink, blue, purple) and/or extreme hairstyles are not permitted.

#### **Buildings and Ground**

During the summer vacation, a number of maintenance tasks were undertaken. The following is a basic list of jobs completed prior to our students coming back to school.

- All knives in the B Block Kitchens were sharpened in preparation for the 2024 school year.
- All ovens in B Block were cleaned in preparation for the 2024 school year.
- High-pressure roof gutter cleaning. As part of the annual maintenance cycle, where accessible, all roof gutters were cleaned around the school.
- Annual service of all gas appliances such as heaters and stoves including a full clean service, gas & carbon monoxide safety check.
- High-pressure underground drain flushed and cleaned to avoid any blockages or flooding for large rain events.
- · Painting of the Old Gymnasium and B Block toilets.



- Basic internal maintenance including general classroom, including cleaning of whiteboards, desks, lockers and carpets.
- Basic external maintenance including tidying ground from leaves, mowing lawns and preparing seating areas.
- New synthetic grass was laid near the Hall redevelopment as a new seating area.

#### Drop offs, pickups and parking

In the interests of safety, please drop off or pick up our students 50 to 100 metres away from the school.

This is also a friendly reminder to make sure you avoid the 'no standing', 'permit' and 'bus zones' when dropping off or collecting our students. Also, please be mindful of where you park around the school and read the signs carefully.

In particular, do not park near or across driveways as it means homeowners find it difficult to get into or out of their driveways. This matter has been raised by numerous neighbours who do not have access to their property due to cars parked across the driveway, particularly at the start and the end of the school day.

#### French LOTE - Nouméa Tour

From 8-15 December 2023, 14 students from Years 10 to 12, Ms Padula, Ms Muir (Bert) and Ms Stewart undertook the Nouméa language and culture tour. Nouméa is the capital of New Caledonia, a French-speaking nation, only 3 ½ hours flying time from Melbourne. We flew with Air Calin and had a very special flight over to celebrate Air Calin's 40th birthday and the resumption of direct flights from Melbourne, complete with birthday cake! New Caledonia has similar weather to Queensland, and we were spoilt by beautiful sunshine every day! It was amazing to see the students embrace the learning experience... whether it was participating in cultural activities, playing with local children, purchasing souvenirs (the currency is the South Pacific Franc, so maths was required as well as French language skills!), ordering ice-cream, snacks or meals or making the most of the French lessons at the language school, our students made us proud! It certainly was a very successful trip - bravo tout le monde!









#### Nouméa Tour - CREIPAC

One of the most amazing aspects of language learning is being able to actually use the language in authentic communicative situations in the country where the target language is spoken. By participating in the Nouméa tour, our students were able to use the language they know for a range of purposes: ordering food, going shopping, listening to our guides, reading information at the aquarium, reading signage around the town... It was really interesting to see how the students were able to make connections between what they had learned in the classroom and how it "worked" in real life. Students were able to consolidate some grammar basics and work on speaking French simply but effectively.

#### Humanities News Australian Geography Competition

The Australian Geography Competition is a contest for Australian secondary school students, assessing their geographical knowledge and skills, mostly made up of multiple-choice questions. The competition aims to encourage student interest in geography and to reward student excellence. The annual Australian Geography competition is running again this year from 15 to 29 May and students from Year 7 to Year 12 are encouraged to participate in the competition, which will run during normal Humanities class time to minimize any disruption to classes. A Compass event will be created, any interested students are invited to seek parental/guardian consent to participate in this fabulous opportunity to showcase their knowledge of Geographical concepts. The entry deadline is Tuesday 12 March, the cost is \$5 per student and certificates of participation are issued to each student.

All participants receive results and certificates (top 1% in Australia, high distinction, distinction, credit or participation). Students will be graded at school year levels – Year 7, Year 8, Year 9, Year 10, Year 11, and Year 12. Outstanding students at each year level win prizes which include books and special certificates, and medals for first in Australia. In past years, Canterbury Girls' students have achieved exceptional results with many receiving High Distinctions, as well as winning their respective age categories. For Year 11 students, there is the chance to represent Australia at the 2025 International Geography Olympiad in Bangkok, Thailand. The competition ensures that students acquire world knowledge and skills that can help them to prepare for final exams. 
